HURRICANE prepared?

Hurricane season begins June 1. To be prepared for a hurricane, it is important to understand how hurricanes are categorized as well as to know what actions to take as they approach.

When we refer to a Hurricane's category, it's helpful to know from where the categorization comes. The Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Wind Scale is a 1 to 5 rating based upon a hurricane's sustained wind speed. This scale is designed to estimate potential property damage. Hurricanes reaching category 3 and higher are considered major hurricanes because of their potential for significant loss of life and damage. Be aware, category 1 and 2 storms are still dangerous and you should still take preventative measures.

Hurricane Categories

1 74-95 mph
Homes could have damage to roof and shingles. Large branches of trees will snap and shallowly rooted trees may topple. Extensive damage to power lines and poles can result in power outages.

2 96-110 mph
Homes may sustain major roof and siding damage.
Shallowly rooted trees will be snapped or uprooted and block roads. Near-total power loss is expected with outages that could last weeks.

3 (major) 111-129 mph
Homes may incur major
damage or removal of roof
decking. Many trees will
be snapped or uprooted,
blocking numerous roads.
Electricity and water may
be unavailable for several
days to weeks after the
storm passes.

4 (major) 130-156 mph
Well-built homes can sustain severe damage with
loss of most of the roof
structure and/or some exterior walls. Most trees will be
snapped or uprooted and
power poles downed. Power
outages may last weeks to
possibly months. Most of
the area will be uninhabitable for weeks or months.

5 (major) 157 mph and higher— A high percentage of framed homes may be destroyed, with total roof failure, and wall collapse. Fallen trees and power poles may isolate residential areas. Power outages may last for possibly months.



A Hurricane is 36 Hours from arriving:

Build your emergency preparedness kit, include a flashlight, batteries, cash and first aid supplies.

Plan to communicate with family members if you lose power. Remember that during disasters, sending texts are usually reliable and faster than making phone calls because lines are often overloaded.

Keep your car in good working condition, and keep the gas tank full; stock your vehicle with emergency supplies and a change of clothes.



A Hurricane is 18-36 Hours from arriving:

Bring loose, lightweight objects inside that could become projectiles in high winds (e.g., patio furniture, garbage cans).

Anchor objects that would be unsafe to bring inside (e.g., propane tanks) and trim or remove trees close enough to fall on the building. Cover all your home's windows.

Permanent storm shutters offer the best protection for windows, or board up windows with 5/8" exterior grade or marine plywood, cut to size, and ready for installation.



A Hurricane is 6-18 Hours from arriving:

Turn on your TV/Radio, or check your city/county website every 30 minutes in order to get the latest weather updates and emergency instructions for your area.

Charge your cell phone now so you will have a full battery in case of power loss.



A Hurricane is 6 hours from arriving:

If you're not in an area that is recommended for evacuation, plan to stay at home or where you are and let friends and family know where you are.

Stay away from windows. Flying glass from broken windows could injure you. Turn your refrigerator or freezer to the coldest setting and open only when necessary. If you lose power, food will last longer. Keep a thermometer in the refrigerator to be able to check the food temperature when the power is restored.

Turn on your TV/radio to check your city/county website every 30 minutes in order to get the latest weather updates and emergency instructions for your area.



Have you ever wondered what a MUD is and what it does? At Harris County MUD 217, we would like to shed some light on exactly who we are and what we do!



MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICTS ARE..

A Municipal Utility District (MUD) is a special governmental entity that is primarily found in 3 states, Texas, Florida, and Colorado. In our state, MUDs are overseen by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and are formed as a tool to finance necessary construction and maintenance of water, sewer and storm drainage infrastructure within its boundaries. Today in Harris County alone, there are over 400 separate Municipal Utility Districts.

HOW IT WORKS

A MUD is governed by a board of 5 directors. All directors are public officials elected by the residents within the District and serve alternating 4 year terms. It is not uncommon for a director to serve consecutive terms as they are not term-limited. The directors generally meet once per month to manage and conduct the business of the District and these meetings are always open to the public, per Texas law. In lieu of a full time staff, a MUD will typically contract with consultants such as attorneys, engineers, bookkeepers, operators, and financial advisors to both guide and deliver the District's operations and services.

MUD SERVICES

A MUD provides water, sewer, and drainage infrastructure improvements for properties within its boundaries. In addition to those services, MUDs may also provide funds for public safety, garbage/recycling collection and disposal, roads, and recreational facilities to the communities within its boundaries. Additionally, a MUD may also levy taxes and issue bonds for maintenance and operations, infrastructure improvements (such as new water plants, sewer and treatment plants) and in some cases recreational amenities.




JOIN OUR GYM!
